



## **Purpose of our Meeting**

- to inform parents and families of their school's participation
- to explain the requirements of the Title I, Part A program
- $\succ$  to explain the right of parents to be involved



# What is Title I?



- Federal program funded to provide all children significant opportunities to receive a fair, equitable, and high-quality education, and to close educational achievement gaps
- Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as amended in 2015 as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)



#### What are the Objectives of Title I in FCPS?

- To improve students' literacy skills and communication
- To develop students' mathematical skills and problem-solving
- ➤ To promote critical and creative thinking
- $\succ$  To foster resiliency and goal-setting
- To encourage collaboration and family engagement





#### How are Schools Selected for Title I?


- FCPS leadership ranks schools in accordance with federal program guidelines
- Schools are identified for Title I funds based on the percentage of students eligible for free or reduced-price meals
- · 42 elementary schools
- · 2 middle schools





#### What Does it Mean to be a Title I School?

Being a Title I school means receiving federal funding (Title I dollars) to <u>supplement</u> the school's existing programs.










#### **Family Engagement Compact Policy**



READING: Standards of Accreditation SOA Pass Rate with Retakes



#### **Reading SOL Data**


**READING: Unadjusted Pass Rate**



By June, 2024, Grade 3 students will increase their pass rate on the Reading SOL from 27% to 54%. (65% in Grades 3-6)




## -All Students Accessing Algebra by Grade 8


